

New paddle-in campsites link 35-mile water trail

Can you say "kayak touring?" State Park improvements make it a reality on the Potomac



ood news for kayakers interested in an odyssey down the Potomac River, as Igor Baras wrote about last month and Ralph Heimlich organized last year/two years ago. Improvements at two state parks on the Potomac River offer new locations for paddle-in camping. Phase I of the development of a new Virginia State Park at Widewater is expected to be complete in September, 2018. Across the river in Maryland, Charles County is set to take over development and management of the existing Maryland State Park at Chapel Point.

Widewater State Park, located at the end of Brent Point Road in Stafford County, will be Virginia's newest state park when it officially opens in September. Comprising 1,089 acres on the Potomac River and Aquia Creek, the park is 16 nautical miles downstream from Leesylvania State Park, and 14 nm upstream from Caledon State Park, both of

which also have paddle-in campsites. Phase I in the park's master

- · A full-service visitor's center with a display area
- · Two canoe/kayak launches, one on each water body (management areas I and IV)



Widewater State Park is slated to open next month.

- · A paddle-in campsite (management area IV) that allows canoes/kayaks to follow the Captain John Smith Trail, providing a link between Leesylvania SP and Caledon SP
- · Two picnic shelters (two more to be built later), one on the Potomac side and one on the
- · Two restrooms, one on each water body
- Two playgrounds on each side
- Individual picnic pads that don't need to be reserved

A possible additional paddle-in camp site is included in a later phase of the Master Plan. Phase I is estimated to cost \$11.5million and development of the entire park is budgeted to cost \$43.1 million over 3 years. See http:// www.dcr.virginia.gov/recreational

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News From the CPA Coordinator - Bill Smith

n June 20th the newly renovated Home Port Farms Park in Edgewater, Maryland was dedicated and reopened to the public after about a six month construction project. Home Port Farms Park, which is dedicated to car-top vessels, is located on Church Creek and is the only public access to the South River. As I stated in previous columns, opening the park was an uphill battle with lots of local resistance, so I would encourage everyone to visit this park. Let's show Anne Arundel County that they made a good choice when they decided to open it to the public and that the car-top boating community appreciates it. To visit the park, you must go on the Anne Arundel County Parks and Rec website and, after you register for Home Port Farms Park, a gate code will appear. Each time you register counts as a vote to keep the park open and for the county to open other soft launch sites.

Another of my favorite Anne Arundel County kayak launches is Spriggs Farm Park in Arnold, Maryland on the Magothy River. This park has been open a few years but is also facing tremendous pressure from the locals to shut it down. The county has proposed installing a boat launch ramp, which may sound detrimental but really isn't because once improvements have been made, the county will commit to keeping it open. The 'save Spriggs Farm Park' campaign has produced a rendering showing a two-lane ramp with the site paved over, which is not what the county is proposing. The real goal of the 'save Spriggs Farm' is the closure of the park so the locals can have it for themselves. I encourage all to utilize this launch; it is a beautiful park and a really nice place to paddle. The way to gain access is the same as Home Port. Register on the AA County website for Spriggs Farm Park; then the gate code will appear.

Another absolute gem of the Chesapeake Bay in danger of closing is Eastern Neck Island located near Rock Hall, Maryland. Eastern Neck

Wildlife Refuge, a 2286-acre island, opened as part of the Chesapeake Marshlands National Wildlife Refuge. I recently read where the park superintendent was moving on and the park was considering not



replacing him/her, which would keep the gate locked to the public. I am not sure what this change would mean for the Bogles Wharf kayak and motor launch. Eastern Neck Island is very popular with paddlers, bird watchers and hikers; it's a great place to view wildlife, so I routinely visit the island year-round. I remember going there a few years ago in the winter after a long cold spell and seeing several bald eagles hanging out near the openings in

the ice, probably trying to catch a fish. You almost always view eagles and ospreys when paddling; on one occasion I saw a golden eagle. On more than one occasion I have paddled through schools of cow-nosed rays, and I once caught a glimpse of a sea turtle. The trip around the island is approximately an 8-mile circumnavigation, with additional miles possible depending on how many creeks you choose to explore. Here is an interesting fact: you can paddle about three miles from Kent Narrows on Kent Island to Eastern Neck Island, but the drive from Kent Narrows is fifty miles by road. Less time in the car and more time on the water - very appealing; just remember that Queen Anne's County requires that you purchase a daily or seasonal launch pass with separate in-state and out-of-state rates.

Do you do any other type of paddling besides sea kayaking? Canoeing, and I have tried SUP and enjoyed it. I have also done whitewater rafting.

Do you regularly do any other outdoor activities? I am an avid cyclist and enjoy hiking as well. Although I love downhill skiing, my fear of falling or being hit outweighs my desire to ski. I do cross country skiing, but my skill level is very low.

How often on average do you paddle between May and October? I try to get on the water 1-2 times a week.

Do any winter paddling? Yes, although this past winter I was in recovery mode because of my broken arm.

Favorite local paddling location? My go-to place is the Dismal Swamp because of the easy access and tranquility. There's no getting lost and I can get into zen mood and not think. I really love it.

Favorite CPA trip you've ever been on and why? They've all been great and memorable. I especially enjoyed the practice kayak

memorable. Despite a sudden
pop-up thunderstorm, we all
survived. I think being on an
island without the distractions
of electronics, etc. made the
trip.

Coolest paddling trip you've ever been on anywhere and why? I had the opportunity to paddle in Florida the month I retired with a one-way plane ticket and not knowing when I was coming back. In-and- of

itself, that set the stage for a memorable experience. Every day we explored a new area. One of my favorite days was when we were paddling at Sanibel Island and 2 or 3 dolphins started playing chase under and around our kayaks. It was so thrilling to watch them through the crystal clear water.

Scariest/most dangerous trip/experience and why? This question has two answers. The scariest experience was on the same trip to Florida when we left St. George for Little St. George Island to camp. The sun was starting to set and the currents were not in our favor. I saw the destination and was determined I was going to make it before the sharks ate me for supper. Happily, we all made it and I learned a lesson in currents.

Many CPA members may have heard about the tree limb falling on my arm and head and breaking my arm on Nov. 10, 2017. It could have been so much worse. The wind blew as I was searching for a suitable bathroom area. Luckily, the tree limb hit me before I stripped down to my birthday suit. I came running out of the woods, "I need help"! Everyone was wonderful and assisted me. The goose egg on my head was a concern, but I assured everyone I had a very hard head. I found out I had a totally displaced ulna, which is the bone along the outer part of the lower arm. A stranger drove me back to Chickahominy Campground where I was tended to, undressed, cared for and nursed in a very compassionate way. My words can't say enough for what everyone did for me. My tent and car were packed, my boat was towed, and I was driven to the hospital on a Friday afternoon! I survived and I promised I'd be back.

Future bucket list trip(s)? Alaska.

Three things you like most about paddling? Connecting with nature, fulfilling my need for exercise and activity, and the spiritual mind-body connection.



Chapel Point State Park in Maryland is located at the confluence of the Port Tobacco and Potomac Rivers, about 11 nm downriver from Virginia's Caledon SP and 19 nm downriver from the new Widewater SP. Chapel Point SP is also adjacent to the new Upper Cedar Point Wildlife Management Area (http://dnr.maryland.gov/wildlife/Pages/publiclands/southern/cedarpoint.aspx) on the west bank of the Port Tobacco River. Chapel Point has been a Maryland state park since 1972 and has an existing soft launch and a paddle-in campsite.

In July, Maryland DNR and Charles County announced that the Board of Public Works

had approved a lease agreement whereby Charles County would develop and manage 49.4 waterfront acres of the park's 821 acres. Objectives of interest to paddlers are:

- \cdot Improvement of the road and parking area at Deep Point, providing an improved launch ramp (limited to 14 foot boats) and doubling parking to 15 car and 5 car/trailer spaces
- · Relocation of the existing paddle-in campsite to a more secluded location, freeing up Midway Beach for more general use
- $\cdot\;$ Developing a new soft launch for kayaks near Chapel Point, with dedicated gravel parking area (10 spaces) and unloading zone

All planned improvements would be completed between 2018 and 2022 (see http://dnr.maryland.gov/publiclands/pages/southern/chapelpoint.aspx).

Both of these changes provide increased water access in the Great Bend section of the Potomac and also increase our ability to do kayak touring along nearly 35 miles of the river, from Leesylvania to Chapel Point. Contact your friends and begin planning your own excursion to check them out! •
